At this service: the Principal Celebrant is the Venerable Kathryn Percival, Archdeacon of the Meon,

and the Preacher is Canon Angela Tilby, *Canon of Honour*. Angela preached in 1994 at the Ordination Service in Manchester and led the 1994 retreat for Lincoln diocese. She preached again in 2004 for the 10th Anniversary services at Manchester, St Paul's Cathedral and York Minster.

The music today, sung by the Cathedral Choir (Girl Choristers) includes part of the Communion setting in G by Francis Jackson that was sung here in 1994 at the Ordination services. A new motet *Est enim in illa spiritus* has been composed for this occasion by Nora Rechel, our Organ Scholar.

The Gathering

Before the start of the service, the Dean escorts Mrs Annabelle Boyes MBE DL, representing His Majesty's Lord-Lieutenant of Hampshire, to her seat. At the entry of the Choir and clergy please stand, if you are able to, for the hymn.

The Liturgy of the Word

A reading from the book of Exodus read by the Revd Amy Adeniran, one of the youngest women priests currently in the diocese.

When the horses of Pharaoh with his chariots and his chariot drivers went into the sea, the Lord brought back the waters of the sea upon them; but the Israelites walked through the sea on dry ground.

Then the prophet Miriam, Aaron's sister, took a tambourine in her hand; and all the women went out after her with tambourines and with dancing. And Miriam sang to them:

'Sing to the Lord, for he has triumphed gloriously;

horse and rider he has thrown into the sea.'

Then Moses ordered Israel to set out from the Red Sea

(15.19-22a)

In our day of thanksgiving one psalm let us offer for the saints who before us have found their reward; when the shadow of death fell upon them we sorrowed, but now we rejoice that they rest in the Lord.

In the morning of life, and at noon, and at even, he called them away from our worship below; but not till his love, at the font and the altar, had girt them with grace for the way they should go.

These stones that have echoed their praises are holy, and dear is the ground where their feet have once trod; yet here they confessed they were strangers and pilgrims, and still they were seeking the city of God.

THE PEACE

Built of tears and cries and laughter, prayers of faith and songs of grace, let this house proclaim from floor to rafter. All are welcome, all are welcome, all are welcome in this place.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

> Eternal Wisdom, source of our being and goal of all our longing, we praise you and give you thanks because you have created us, women and men, together in your image, to cherish your world and seek your face.

Divided and disfigured by sin, while we were yet helpless you emptied yourself of power and took upon you our unprotected flesh. You laboured with us on the cross and have brought us forth to the hope of resurrection.

Therefore, with the woman who gave you birth, the women who befriended you and fed you, who argued with you and touched you, the woman who anointed you for death, the women who met you, risen from the dead, and with all who have loved you throughout the ages, we praise you, singing:

Holy, holy, holy Lord God of hosts, heaven and earth are full of thy glory. Glory be to thee, O Lord most high.

The concelebrants join in with the principal celebrant.

Lord, you are holy indeed, the source of all holiness; grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit, and according to your holy will, these gifts of bread and wine may be to us the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ; who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me. In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks;

he gave it to them, saying:

Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Deacon Great

Great is the mystery of faith:

All Christ has died: Christ is risen: Christ will come again.

And so, Father, calling to mind his death on the cross, his perfect sacrifice made once for the sins of the whole world; rejoicing in his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming in glory, we celebrate this memorial of our redemption.

As we offer you this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, we bring before you this bread and this cup and we thank you for counting us worthy to stand in your presence and serve you. Send the Holy Spirit on your people and gather into one in your kingdom all who share this one bread and one cup, so that we, in the company of all the saints, may praise and glorify you for ever, through Jesus Christ our Lord; by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

Please follow the instructions of the sidespeople. If you would prefer a blessing, please carry this service booklet as a signal to the minister.


No one is obliged to receive the wine if they prefer not to – but intinction (dipping the wafer into the cup) will not be permitted, so as to ensure the best safety of all.




PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION
